Fired tiles pose no chemical risk to the environment. Skip to landfill waste or stack for use elsewhere. Crushed tiles can be used as inert aggregate

Polypropylene strapping, polythene covers and wooden pallets purchased with tiles should be disposed of safely and with thought to the environment. Advice on the preferred method should be obtained from the local authority waste disposal officer

HANDLING & STORAGE

Packs of tiles are heavy and care should be used in their handling. Care must be taken to lift and carry only what feels reasonable to the person involved.

Equipment used for handling pallets must be adequate for the weights involved. The weights of pallets vary according to contents but the nominal pallet weight of tiles is 1.3 tonnes.

Pallets must be placed on firm level ground one high only.

EXPOSURE CONTROL

There are no occupational exposure limits associated with Tudor roof tiles.

Persons in contact with roof tiles should understand the need and required use of protective equipment and clothing plus be trained in line with current Manual Handling Regulations.
